Campus Resources

- Dean of Students Office (404-364-8336) or Assistant Dean & Director of Housing (404) 364-8520: Staff can assist a student in filing formal complaints or, if the student does not want to file a formal complaint, the staff can work with the student to address concerns over housing, class assignments or schedules, leaves of absence, withdrawal or other academic concerns. The office staff can also assist the student in notifying Campus Security or local law enforcement, if the student so requests.
- Counseling Services (404-364-8456): Students can meet with a confidential mental health counselor. The counseling center provides support and information, appropriate referral services, and a safe space.
- Campus Security (404-504-1998): Campus Security can advise students of their options, help preserve evidence while they consider options, and assist students in safety planning.
- Professional Staff on Duty (404-919-6875): Staff members are trained in matters of sexual assault and are available to help you get assistance and consider your options.
- University Chaplain-Rev. Dr. John Richardson (205- 807-4907): The Chaplain is available to provide supportive counseling and assistance.
